After lunch Bob was able to spend time with Sinai and Jordan Domingo, aged nine and seven, who are sponsored by St Mary's, Kirriemuir.

On Monday 20 March Bob visited Sinai in his classroom and met his teacher. There was also a visit to the farm, where there are lots of cows, whose milk is used to make cheese. Principal Brian provided samples of cheese for tasting.

After Kalimpong there was sightseeing in Delhi and Agra, which incuded a visit to the Taj Mahal. Meeting the Domingo brothers was the high point of Bob's visit to India. It was lovely to see them looking so well, so smart and so happy. Dr Graham's legacy, begun in 1900, continues to provide education, shelter and a safe passage through adolescence for Indian children.
