Dear Friends,

It is with much joy I write to you, as the new Dean of St Andrew's, Dunkeld and Dunblane. After much prayer and consideration after Bishop Ian approached me to become the Dean, I truly believe that God has called me to fulfil this role for the next stage of my ministry.

In the pilgrimage of life our God of grace and love, calls us on, calls each of us into unfamiliar places and new opportunities, giving thanks for all that we have been given in the past and looking forward with much hope for all that is to come. I hope and pray that as we journey together into the future, we will do just that, reflect, and give much thanks to God.

I look forward very much to meeting you all, as we journey in this diocese with God's love and grace freely given to us, as we reach out into the communities with the people we serve, and as we tell the story of Christ's wonderful love for all.

I realise how much effort and time was expended in planning the logistics, including for you a preparatory walk, and in getting so many people involved in facilitating the spiritual aspects of our walk, as well as providing hospitality at the end."

About 30 began the journey in Ceres, and with those joining along the way at stops at Craigtoun Park, Hallow Hill and Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church, we were about 60-strong by the time we reached All Saints' Episcopal Church for refreshments and Evening Prayer.

Stirling Eco Congregations network - Refresh, Renew, Reset





As we all emerge and reflect on the impact of the pandemic on the whole of life on earth, it is a good time to refresh, renew and reset our thinking on many things. Churches in Stirling have taken part in the ecumenical Great Britain & Ireland initiative called Climate Sunday. The idea is to hold a climate focussed service in the run up to COP26 to explore the theological and scientific basis of creation care and action on climate, to pray, and to commit to action. This initiative fits well with the season of 'Creationtide' that is being promoted by Eco-Congregations Scotland. Their Eco-Chaplain, David Coleman, will be speaking in Stirling on 14th October at Stirling Methodist Church on 'Faith and the Environment' as part of Stirling's Climate Festival. The run up to COP26 is also time for us to renew and refresh our collaboration and partnerships with other people of faith in tackling the complexities of Climate Change and more that 50 religious leaders have signed 'The Glasgow Multifaith Declaration for COP26'.

The Stirling Eco-Congregations Network is, through the leadership of the Stirling Methodists Green Team, helping to support the Young Christians Climate Network as they complete their relay to Glasgow from Cornwall. Their #RiseToThe Moment initiative has engaged many people in prayer and action, and you could help by volunteering your time

and talents to walk with them, welcome them, or feed them on Saturday 30th October: for more information contact jon@cameroncape.net

The programme begins with three compositions for brass from Giovanni Gabrieli's posthumous masterpiece, Canzone e Sonate (1615) and continues by exploring the first flowering of new compositions written around 1850 for the new chromatic brass championed in Paris by Adolphe Sax and other makers. It finishes with some masterly British song arrangements penned by Beethoven for Edinburgh publisher George Thomson.

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Godly Play - 9th October 2021









Thank you to everyone who took part in the Godly Play workshop. It was a very interesting day and enjoyment was had by all!

Godly Play is a very different, but amazingly engaging, creative and imaginative method for exploring our Christian faith and heritage.

It is not about learning lessons, keeping children entertained or telling children what they need to know. It's about experiencing and exploring the sacred stories of God's people, of knowing Jesus through his life and his parables and understanding the way in which we approach God though liturgical action.

Jessica Lang, the Young Church Coordinator at Saint Andrew's, St Andrews who has developed a thriving Godly Play community there, provides a further description of its impact:

'During Godly Play the children are invited to discover who God is through multi-sensory storytelling, openended wondering, and creative hands-on response time. Children are invited to engage their imagination as they experience their faith through sacred stories, parables, and liturgical actions while gaining Christian language and enhancing their spiritual experience through wonder and play. '

Although it was originally developed as a resource for children, 3 years through the end of primary school, Godly Play is now being used with a wide range of age groups, in a diversity of settings.

Collect: Almighty God, you have built your Church on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone. Collect: Almighty God, who inspired Luke the physician to proclaim the love and healing power of your Son: give your Church, by the grace of the Spirit and the medicine of the gospel, the same love and power to heal; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

James of Jerusalem, Martyr c.62 - 23 October

Collect: Almighty God, whose servant James was faithful in prayer, devoted to the poor, and accepted persecution: grant us grace to follow his example; to walk in the way of the just; and to witness to our risen Lord, Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen. Readings: Acts 15.12-22a, Psalm 1, James 1.26-27 or 1 Corinthians 15.1-11, Mark 3.28-35 or Matthew 13.54-58

Twenty-second Sunday after Pentecost – 24 October

Collect: Lord God our redeemer, who heard the cry of your people and sent your servant Moses to lead them out of slavery, free us from the tyranny of sin and death, and by the leading of your Spirit bring us to our promised land; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Readings: Jeremiah 31.7-9, Psalm 126, Hebrews 7.23-28, Mark 10.46-52

Simon and Jude, Apostles - 28 October

Collect: Almighty God, we thank you for the glorious company of the apostles, and especially on this day for Simon and Jude. As they were faithful and zealous in their mission, so may we with ardent devotion make known the love and mercy of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Readings: Deuteronomy 32.1-4 or Isaiah 28.14-16, Psalm 119.89-96, Ephesians 2.13-22, John 15.17-27

Twenty-third Sunday after Pentecost – 31 October Collect: Almighty God, whose chosen servant Abraham obeyed your call, rejoicing in your promise that in him the family of the earth is blessed, give us faith like his, that in us your promises may be fulfilled; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
