Signs of Hope



Candlemas on 2 February comes just as the days start to get longer. Tradition makes is a day to predict the weather: 'if Candlemas Day is fair and bright, winter will have another flight; if the day brings clouds and rain, winter will not come again.' So we may hope for a wet day!

Just before Candlemas, on 27 January, we marked Holocaust Memorial Day, for the millions who were murdered. Survivors of the camps said that every Friday some people made candles from threads pulled from worn striped uniforms and fat taken from spare inadequate rations. Other prisoners said this was madness, they were all starving to death and needed the fat as food. But those who made the candles knew, as they kindled the light each Friday night, that the hope it symbolised was more important than food alone. Some of them say that they survived only because of those improvised Sabbath lights keeping hope alive.

Hope is lighting one candle rather than sitting in darkness. It is not a noun, a word for a feeling, an optimism. It is a verb, a word for living in a certain way, an action. Hope makes us act differently, for peace, for truth, for justice, for love.

Every congregation in our Diocese, and every member of it, is called to be a light of hope. In the season of Lent, which starts next month, I want to renew my own calling to hope. The word 'Lent' comes from the old English 'lencten', which means 'lengthen,' referring to the lengthening of the days in spring.



As the days get longer now, I will be looking ahead to the start of that season, and thinking about what I need to do to 'lengthen' the light in my life, so I can become a better sign of hope. I hope that you may join me, and join the times of prayer and study, offered by your church, for growing in hope.

One of my favourite prayers in the Scottish Prayer Book says, "We give thee thanks for the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy saints, who have been the choice vessels of thy grace, and the lights of the world in their generations." Today we are the lights of the world in our own generation. Whenever the candles are blown out in church, it is over to us to be living candles, lights of the world, and signs of hope.

Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty, the Queen

The celebrations to mark HM the Queen's 70 years on the Throne will take place mainly on the weekend of 2-5 June, while 6 February is also being marked as the date on which she became Queen in 1952. Churches in the Diocese are making plans, with other churches in the community, to mark these occasions. The Liturgy Committee of the SEC has created a prayer which has been authorised by the College of Bishops, and is commended to be used in worship at these times:



Almighty and eternal God, you uphold and govern all things both in heaven and on earth, and by your grace alone kings and queens do reign. We thank you for all the blessings which you have bestowed upon us throughout the reign of our sovereign lady, Queen Elizabeth, whom you have set over us these threescore years and ten. We thank you for the wisdom of her guidance and her love of peace,

for the care and devotion with which she has served her people,

for the example of her gracious life.

As we rejoice before you with thankful hearts,

we pray that we may ever be united in love and service to one another,

as people called to live according to your will, for the good of all the world, and the glory of your great name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Lambeth Conference 2022




The Lambeth Conference of Anglican Bishops from around the world is taking place in Canterbury from 26 July to 8 August. It was postponed in 2020, but is going ahead this year instead. However, because of pandemic travel concerns, visiting bishops have been requested to travel directly to Canterbury, and dioceses in Britain are no longer being asked to offer hospitality. That means, very regretfully, that Bishop Marinez of Amazonia (Brazil) and Bishop Paritosh of Calcutta (India) will not after all be able to visit us in the Diocese before Lambeth.

The Global Partnership Committee is working on an alternative plan to have a **Diocesan Gathering** on the Lambeth Conference theme ('God's Church for God's World') **after** the **Conference** instead of before it - in September perhaps - celebrating our global partnership links, including a report of the Conference from Bishop lan and, possibly, online participation by Bishop Marinez and Bishop Paritosh.

Lent 2022



Because the Lambeth Conference is a renewal of our commitment to the world-wide Anglican Communion, Bishop Ian is calling for churches and people in the Diocese to make this our focus for the season of Lent, using Lent study material from USPG (the international Anglican mission partnership), and supporting the work of USPG by giving to this year's Bishop's Lent Appeal.

Bishop Ian commends the study course, 'Living Stones, Living Hope', as a way we can connect with the theme of the Lambeth Conference and reflect on the key scripture passages for it, and prepare with him for the Conference.

Community Pantry Opens in St Luke's



A new community pantry has opened in St Luke's in Glenrothes to help vulnerable people and families who are suffering from food poverty.

From Fife Today news:

The church originally planned to provide a community cafe, but as more people than ever face hardship, the decision was made to supply a pantry instead to try to stem the numbers going hungry as they chose between heat or eat.

Father Gerry Dillon said: "After consultation with people from the community we decided it would be more practical to provide a pantry rather than a cafe as there are more people than ever facing food poverty.

"We have also highlighted a need to provide classes that focus on cooking skills to ensure that people are able to create nutritious meals for themselves and their families.

"Through funding from the National Lottery Community Fund we have been able to take on a part time community pantry officer, and luckily for us, Gayle Wilson from Leslie Community Pantry has stepped into the role bringing a wealth of experience and knowledge to it."

Father Gerry said that St Luke's goal is to support the community no matter what issues it may face. "We not only help with food poverty but with emotional and mental health wellbeing as well as spiritual support," he said. "Working alongside various partners we are planning several mental health events that will encourage people to take a break and to look after themselves."

As the group continues to plan for initiatives and encourage and highlight the important and interesting things happening and starting to happen in our congregations and communities, we also continue to enthusiastically solicit and engage your stories, no matter how large scale or small - from community and global initiatives to personal commitments that are turning into habits. Everything counts! And our responses to climate change are as interesting, meaningful and unique as we are!

In this month's E-News, we highlight stories about two individuals taking and leading action in their own sphere of influence: an adventurous global initiative and the wonderful action and influence from an insightful young person in our diocese. Both are inspiring leaders in their own right. And these two stories both come through one source (me). Look around, even if you don't think you have a compelling story or initiative to share (you are likely mistaken!), you probably know others who do! Share it with us!

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Who inspires you?

Adventure, thy name is Erden

I am fortunate to know a dedicated, exciting adventurer who frequently inspires and delights me with his escapades of grand proportion. While working as an IT/Project Management consultant many years ago in Washington, DC, I met Erden Eruç, a colleague and talented software engineer originally from Turkey who lives his life with a discipline, commitment and intensity that I found thrilling, both in the office and in his fascinating endeavours around the world.

He has climbed Denali (Mt McKinley) in Alaska, Mt Kosciuszko in Australia Mt Kilimanjaro in Africa, and has his sights set on Mt Everest and Mt Elbrus in Eastern Europe in the next fourteen months, as part of his current adventure.

As I write this, Erden is on his 227th day in the Pacific Ocean - rowing from Crescent City, California to Hong Kong - on his SECOND solo circumnavigation around the globe. He has seventeen Guinness world records and many historic firsts, including the first solo circumnavigation around the earth by human power (which culminated in July 2012).

He left Northern California on 22 June 2021 and is expecting to reach Hong Kong next month. You can follow his expedition and progress here and on his home page for Around 'n Over.

As exciting as this is to consider and to follow, why am I including his story here? Because among Erden's many fine qualities is his commitment to our climate. His mission for this current circumnavigation effort is to highlight the plastics problem in our oceans in partnership with Ocean Recovery Alliance (ORA), who is producing a stream of educational content in English, Chinese, Spanish and Turkish. Erden will participate in these classrooms regularly by satellite phone. You can see one of these engagements here. Erden is also collecting ambient sound data for NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in the US) using a high frequency hydrophone. The data will identify the range of Beaked Whales along his transect. Other species may also be identified once the data is archived and made public.

He has been accompanied so far by wildlife both in the sea and the

air, with whale, shark and marlin sightings, and many avian visitors taking refuge on his boat from long flights, including red-footed boobies, noddy terns and shearwaters. An occasional flying fish may also find its way onto his deck.

As grand as his adventurous pilgrimage is, his primary actions in response to climate change are just like ours - raising awareness, taking responsibility for his own carbon footprint, whether on sea or on land (you will notice the solar panels he has fitted to his row boat) and encouraging all to do the same. He is integrating that commitment to the climate into his passion for adventure. While rowing ourselves across an ocean is not a climate action any of us reading this newsletter will likely ever take, we *can* find ways to incorporate climate change awareness and action into our own passionate projects and our daily lives.

Tiger Lily

While Erden has set off on a climate adventure around the world, one of my local heroes is modelling for all of us the way we can make an important difference right where we are.



Young Lily Drage lives with her family - parents Dan and Kimberly, and younger sister Joanna - in St Andrews. They each are inspiring leaders in raising climate awareness and modelling and encouraging change. Together, they are quite a force for climate action in our community.

At thirteen, Lily is doing her part to help keep her carbon footprint small. She is most pleased about her and her family's efforts to buy second hand, reuse items and reduce plastic - especially single use. She has been encouraged by what is happening at home and at school, saying, 'My family has been buying a lot less single use plastic

and brand new things made of plastic; and my friends and I do make an effort to put our rubbish in the bin and avoid single use plastic.' In addition to these actions, Lily believes that two of the most tangible impacts she is making personally are using a reusable mask and a metal insulated water bottle. 'It makes me feel better that I am doing something to help,' she commented.

In addition to efforts at her home and school, Lily is very pleased with the commitment she sees in her church community of Saint Andrews, St Andrews and is encouraged by the initiatives underway. It is inspiring to see her so knowledgeable and attuned to what is happening within the congregation, and to hear her, without skipping a beat, mention all the impactful initiatives our Eco Congregation group here have stewarded (it perhaps helps that her mother, Kimberly Drage, is a key member of this group!):

- Double glazing the windows in the church hall.
- Getting solar panels on the roof of the church soon.
- The green ticket scheme people are using to track their carbon savings and sacrifices.
- The COP26 24-hour prayer vigil with reflection stations held at the church.
- Developing the gardens around the church (in which Lily and other members of our Young Church take part, led by Jenny Evetts, the church's wonderfully dedicated 'garden keeper' and Eco Congregation member.

Lily helped make the signs for the plants in the beds on the outside wall of the church and said she 'got cool information about potatoes from Jenny – how they grow and how to take care of them.'

Lily feels most passionate about climate change when she is out in nature: 'It's about respecting the world,' she says. Nature - especially animals and walking the Lade Braes in St Andrews - is what is most personal for her, what is most familiar and what she likes.

She cares very much about the impact of climate change on wildlife and took part in making climate change posters at her school. For her part, Lily made a drawing, and named the work *Tiger: Paws*, a play on the homophones 'paws' and 'pause'.

She said she imagined 'wildlife talking to us humans and asking us to hear them – they don't like it.' She said she feels guilty (on behalf of all humans) about the animals' predicatment – 'It's not their fault.'

She hopes to encourage people to pause and pay attention to our wildlife.

Like most, Lily feels the enormity of climate change and the challenges we face, especially in believing we can make a difference as individuals. She comments, 'Sometimes you feel like you are on your own. . . and it can be hard to feel hope about it'. But she offers encouragement:

'Keep going, even though it may seem like a lot of other people aren't doing enough. There are lots of people who are. A lot of people are aware and that gives me hope.'

And she, like so many young people who are helping to lead climate action efforts, give all of us hope.
